#### The Interplay of International Trade and Arbitration: One Step Forward or One Step Backward?

As the world moves forward and regains normalcy, it has witnessed creative and remote ways of conducting international trade. With such development, two schools of thought have emerged. One being the proponent of maintaining arbitration and its incorporation in contracts as a way to solve trade disputes due to finality and efficiency, and the other holding the view that arbitration is no longer suitable to facilitate trade dispute settlement. With recent endeavours by international arbitration stakeholders to better the workings of this dispute settlement mechanism, are we actually taking one step forward, or should we take one step backwards and assess whether less or more should be done to facilitate the interplay of international trade and arbitration.

Despite being an oft discussed subject in international commercial arbitration, contractual claims often become pitfalls for the disputing parties when it is not considered carefully.
